

DEAR ANN BANCROFT FOUNDATION SUPPORTERS,

What can we say about 2020? There was so much that was good and yet so much heartbreak around the world. Each year we seek to pause and reflect on the year – our challenges, achievements, and stories of resilience from our girls and for our work here at the Ann Bancroft Foundation.

A mentor wrote to us this last fall: "Like so many of us, the pandemic has taken away the opportunity to participate in the activities we love. Getting this grant, at this time, would allow Jessica to continue creating art even in the midst of COVID-19, and to still feel like she is working her way to her goals."

This is why we do this work.

The pandemic was particularly hard on women and girls around the world. Because of this, we are even more dedicated to our work to invest in a girl's dream to nurture her confidence, self-esteem, pride, and self-advocacy by connecting girls with activities that let them show the world what they are really made of.

Prior to the pandemic, we expected 2020 to be our largest grantmaking year in our history. We started off 2020 strong, but were quickly overcome with the reality of the pandemic and its impact on our girls, their families, and our work. We ended up suspending our spring grant cycle as the state was shutting down and girls' activities were cancelled and programs shuttered.

We were back in the fall and, although our numbers were lower than usual, we were thrilled to support 80 girls to make their dreams come true! We remained committed to increasing our geographic range across Minnesota and were able to increase our reach to 77 of 87 Minnesota counties.

During 2020 our mission remained unchanged, but how we served girls needed to shift. We quickly turned to virtual programming and offered more than a dozen virtual opportunities for girls to come together for peer learning and education. We updated our website to offer links to community emergency resources, mental health resources, and updated information on our grantmaking plans.

Our staff was working from home, our volunteers were volunteering from home, and our long-standing in-person Annual Celebration and Fundraiser became a virtual event.

Although our 2020 Annual Celebration and Fundraiser was virtual, we were still able to raise \$230,000, surpassing our revised goal! Thank you to the 600 of you who attended remotely from around the state, the country, and the world. Our event was a success because of your continued support of us even during extremely uncertain times.

Also, in 2020 our Executive Director, Sara Fenlason, departed after an amazing 6 years at the helm here. Sara was our first executive director and laid the groundwork for a strong organizational structure and grantmaking program. We are forever grateful for her leadership and vision. We have an interim ED in place (Christine Ganzlin) and will be announcing a new Executive Director in the upcoming months.

We recently received a note from one of our 2012 trailblazers, Abby. She described how her grant to attend a camp at Wolf Ridge Environmental Learning Center "led me to discover a passion for outdoor science, further leading me to a degree in geology and two international field research projects." We are so proud of her and the path she has created for herself.

As we write this, some of the pandemic restrictions are being lifted here in Minnesota and other places around the world. As pandemic restrictions continue to evolve, however, we are hopeful that we can more fully get back to the business of serving girls so that they can realize their dreams and feel supported along the way.

2022 marks the 25th Anniversary of the Ann Bancroft Foundation. We will announce a new strategic plan that includes input gathered from many of you, our donors, and friends. Save the date – our 25th Anniversary Celebration will be in person next year on April 28, 2022, at The Depot in Minneapolis!

Thank you for all you do for the Ann Bancroft Foundation and the girls and mentors we support. And thank you for staying on the journey with us over this last year.



Spring 2017 Trailblazer

My name is Naomi Lopez, and I'm an alumna of ABF. I used my ABF grant to attend a pre-college program at Carnegie Mellon University when I was 16 years old.

Now, I am a senior at Carleton College and study political science. This year, I'm also applying to law school! I'm pursuing a career in Child Protection and Juvenile Justice. I strongly believe we all should invest in the well-being and growth of children, particularly BIPOC youth. I've enjoyed working with dedicated non-profits and professionals in Minnesota with similar goals.

If you are a past recipient of an Ann Bancroft Foundation grant or are interested in applying, you have done something in your life that is worth being proud of. Congratulations! Maybe you learned a challenging piece of music in band, beat your personal record during a race, or earned some stellar grades in school. These are all accomplishments you should confidently claim and say, "Yeah, I just did that." Girls in our society, however, are taught to downplay their successes and not brag.

When I was younger, I struggled to accept any praise for my work. I missed so many opportunities to celebrate the awesome stuff I did as a result. I was reminded of the importance of taking ownership and pride in my achievements when I started college last fall. I worked hard throughout high school (and during the summers thanks to my Dare to Dream grant) and got into my dream college.

I was accepted into my school on my own merit, but I somehow felt out of place and underqualified. It was a classic case of imposter syndrome. The term imposter syndrome is used to describe a pattern of negative thinking a person may have when they are rewarded for their success. Although individuals deserve their accomplishments, they may experience feelings of doubt and inadequacy. To overcome my imposter syndrome, I reflected on all the studying, extracurriculars, and hard work I had done in order to get into college.

I challenge girls involved with ABF to take a moment to reflect on something they did in the past year that made them proud. Think about how much effort, bravery, and skill it took! We have all done something awesome, so let's own it!

POSITIVELY IMPACTING MN GIRLS

Each year the Ann Bancroft Foundation evaluates the impact of its programming by having grant recipients respond to a survey before and after their grant-funded experience.

During 2020 the Ann Bancroft Foundation, like others, had to shift and work to best meet the needs of our girls and other stakeholders. We worked to stay connected with our grant recipients. This did not always prove to be an easy task with our Trailblazers taking on the daunting task of navigating the many challenges of COVID-19 – distance learning, families struggling with unemployment, illness from COVID-19, mental health concerns, and online fatigue.


We opened our regular Spring 2020 grant round, but eventually cancelled the spring grants because most programming and experiences for Trailblazers were cancelled due to the pandemic.

We had a successful Fall 2020 grant round (although smaller than most years due to COVID-19), and we did not get those evaluation results until recently, so they will be reported in our next Annual Impact Report.

In 2018 and 2019, we awarded \$358,670 to 751 girls across Minnesota. We are proud that in 2019, 25% of our grants went to girls who live outside of the 7-county Twin Cities Metro region.

We can report some amazing cumulative evaluation results for the years leading up to 2020.

84% of evaluated grant recipients report that without their ABF grant, they were not sure that they would have been able to participate in their funded activity.

of girls surveyed agreed that their funded activity helped them learn more about themselves, was a good experience, and changed their lives for the better.

ABOUT OUR GRANTEES




GRANTEES BY GRADE AT TIME OF AWARD

AWARD DISTRIBUTION MAP





THE ANN BANCROFT IMPACT AWARD

Linda Green, the owner of Art of Dance Studio in Brooklyn Park, was the recipient of the 2020 ABF Impact Award. Linda is the living embodiment of "Imagine Something Bigger," realizing her dreams for dance with the opening of her own studio in 2002. She has taught and mentored hundreds of girls over the years including more than 55 ABF Trailblazers. Linda is one of our strongest advocates in her community and is truly a friend of ABF.

In Linda's own words: "I've always wanted to dance. It's my passion. I love the art of dance and that empowered me to say, 'You know what, I didn't have this when I was really little.' I had a dream that one of these days not only am I going to dance on the big stage, but I'm going to make sure that other girls are going to do the same thing. And what better than to teach them the art of dance. That's are extension of me and that's what I want to give back.

The Ann Bancroft Foundation has meant so much to these students. I feel like ABF is giving the same thing that I have given. They are giving the opportunity where girls wouldn't have one before to learn the art of dance, to experience dance in a way that impacts them to have self esteem, self-worth, and confidence to go out into the world and say, 'You know what? I can do this.'"



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
