ORGANIZATION OVERVIEW

Supporting Girls and Investing in Tomorrow's Leaders

For 25 years, the Ann Bancroft Foundation (ABF) has invested in girls'* futures and equipped them with the skills needed to thrive. ABF supports and fosters high levels of achievement and empowerment in early childhood and adolescent girls by leveraging grants, mentorship, and development opportunities to boldly inspire girls to imagine something bigger and instill in them the belief in their ability to succeed. To date, ABF has awarded grants to more than 5,300 Minnesota girls in grades K-12 to fund a wide range of transformational activities and experiences. Grants from ABF tell girls they are valued, that we celebrate their dreams, and we believe in the future they see for themselves.

The Urgency to Positively Impact Girls

Without a doubt, 2020 and 2021 have impacted everyone, and existing gender disparity gaps continue to widen. In Minnesota, data shows that girls (grades K-12), especially from historically excluded communities, have been among those most impacted in health, safety, and education. In addition, data from the CDC shows that adolescent mental health-related ER visits have gone up 31% during COVID-19. Girls accounted for a 50% increase in suspected suicide attempts; boys experienced a 4% increase. Minnesota girls need us now more than ever. Thankfully, we know that self-efficacy is one of the protective psychological barriers known to mediate the effects of traumatic events. We also know that ABF grants allow girls to participate in activities and experiences that increase self-efficacy and equip them with the skills needed to thrive and believe in their ability to be unstoppable. We closed 2021 with a renewed commitment to reaching more girls across all counties in Minnesota to help meet the challenges they face today while equipping them with tools for future success.

A LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ETHELIND B. KABA



Hello friends,

I am thrilled to have ended 2021 as the second Executive Director of the Ann Bancroft Foundation. During this time, I met many of you and I hope to meet many more; from our trailblazers to longtime friends, new supporters, and partners. As I reflect on 2021, through our many conversations, one theme resonates with me: **Courage!**

It takes courage to put one foot in front of the other when the path is unclear. It takes courage to dream, and pursue that dream, especially in the face of setbacks and pushbacks. It takes courage to recognize injustice and lift our voices against it. And it takes courage to support and encourage possibilities and joy.

Thanks to this community, we courageously accomplished so much in 2021 and we are grateful.

- We were guided by the leadership of our dedicated board, a committed interim director, resilient staff, and passionate volunteers.
- We exceeded our revenue goals for 2021.
- Activity providers began opening their doors again, and girls began actualizing their dreams again. As a result, we awarded grants to 208 girls, 130 more than in 2020.

As we look to future years, we continue to ponder the state of girls in Minnesota and how we can best champion their potential to imagine bigger. Girls in Minnesota continue to endure too much, especially in the last two years. They have held the disappointment of the pandemic shutting down many activities that fostered empowerment, health, and wellness. We continue to see the effects of the pandemic and other events accelerate rates of anxiety, depression, and suicide attempts in our youth, particularly girls. They hold the fears of gun violence and mass shootings in their communities. In some families and communities, girls are burdened with providing care at home to younger siblings while their caregivers or parents take extra shifts as frontline and essential workers. And with the overturning of *Roe v. Wade*, the message to early childhood and adolescent girls is that they may not have autonomy to make decisions over their own bodies, yet again threatening their empowerment.

These and other reasons are why we are doubling down on our investment in girls, to continue providing safe spaces for them to pursue experiences that build confidence, self-efficacy, coping skills, critical thinking, joy, healing, and big dreaming beyond the current realities.

How can we be unstoppable if there appear to be constant barriers and systems threatening progress toward a more gender-equal world?

We know we cannot do this work alone. We look forward to a strategic plan that clearly articulates our priorities, identifies coalitions and partners, and cements our purpose, promise, and potential to Minnesota girls and our state as a whole.

Thank you for walking beside us with courage. We are grateful for what we are building together, and are excited for the future.

MAYA, TRAILBLAZER

Q: HOW DID YOU HEAR ABOUT THE ANN BANCROFT FOUNDATION?

A: I heard about the Ann Bancroft Foundation from my mom, who heard it from our family friend who received a grant.



Q: WHAT DID YOU APPLY YOUR GRANT TOWARD?

A: I used my grant towards buying a camera. Karlyn and I went to a shop and we spent at least an hour going through the options, and after some brainstorming, we ended up buying a used Canon EOS Rebel T5i since it had a jack port I could connect to my microphone. The whole point of buying this camera was to film interviews of my dad's family and their stories from Vietnam.



Q: HOW DID YOU CHOOSE YOUR MENTOR?

A: I tend to always choose Karlyn as my mentor for anything really. I've known her my whole life, she's like my aunt. I go over to her house all the time (our dogs are dating, possibly getting married soon). Anyway, Karlyn is always supportive of what I do and I knew she'd be able to help me with her creative writing brain.

Q: WHAT DID YOU LEARN FROM THE EXPERIENCE? HOW HAVE YOU CHANGED?

A: I've learned a lot to say the least. I learned some skills on interviewing, I learned how much language is a part of a culture and how much I wish I knew Vietnamese. I learned what my family has gone through, I learned that some of my family members could recall memories from decades ago perfectly and talk for hours while some only spoke for half an hour. Although not knowing Vietnamese has felt like it isolated me from some of my family members, and really it has, my interviews have helped connect me to them and also to my culture.



KARLYN COLEMAN MENTOR

"I was thrilled when Maya reached out. I know her parents from college at UW Madison and I've been a writer and a teacher for years. I love storytelling. I've also been mentored as a writer through the Loft Mentorship program, so I understand how powerful mentorship can be. I worked with Maya from the start of her project. I went with her to buy her camera for videotaping oral histories, was with her as she collected family stories, spent lots of time on my porch with our dogs talking through how the project was going, and even helped her shape the experience into part of her college entrance essay. I am excited to see how this continues to influence her life.

To be able to mentor a young woman while this whole window is opening up for her around family and identity was an honor. I was able to witness Maya blossom — despite frustrations and complexities within the project — and grow in understanding. Family stories are messy and layered, but Maya came through the documentation process with such huge admiration for her father, grandpa and uncles. I could see her curiosity growing. I know the story will continue and will be a driving force for her throughout her life."

Q: WHAT ARE YOU UP TO NOW/NEXT?

A: I've asked my cousin Lee to help me translate the hours and hours of footage. I hope to take a film class or join an organization at University of Wisconsin-Madison (where I'll be attending this fall) and put all of the footage into one movie.

EXCERPTS FROM GRANT APPLICATIONS

ALL IT TAKES IS A VOICE

"I really care about our environment. I am concerned about the consequences of littering on the environment. Improper disposal of industrial and household waste produces greenhouse gases, which increases the temperature of the earth. To help solve this, along with two of my friends, I created a phone app. With this grant, I am planning to create professional marketing materials, meet with potential buyers (travel expenses) and publish my app in the app store."

Anushka, 16, entrepreneur

"The activity I plan to participate in with this grant is my high school's 2022 trip to Japan. This is important to me because traveling with groups of people from my school and meeting other people from a different culture makes me see the world on a bigger level when I am in a place that is different from what I am used to. This challenges me to think about opinions and thoughts that differ from my own as it helps me gain an insight into who I am. I hope to discover parts of me that I have hidden away throughout 2021."

Sun Shine, 17, travel

"I will be participating on the Elk River High School Speech Travel Team. Speech provides me a platform to use my voice for good. Too often, I've heard degrading statements downplaying teens' ability to spark change like we aren't as strong as adults, we aren't able to change the world—but we can. I've been captivated by how teens, through speech, changed, and made into a better person, and I've had the opportunity to do the same. **All it takes is a voice**, and speech has taught me the power of my words."

"I would like to participate in the competition hip hop team at my dance studio. I tried out and made the team. My mom is worried that it is too expensive and since it is optional, she isn't sure I am able to participate. I really like hip hop and I have never gotten to do this style before. I would like to be a dance teacher when I grow up and own my own studio. I am on the quiet side and kind of like things I am familiar with, so competition pushes me to do something out of my comfort zone."

"I would like to learn how to play the accordion because it sounds very fun. And I would like to be really good at it. (My mentor) can come over and listen to the songs that I have learned, and she is going to keep saying 'you can do this! You can do this!'"

Kira Lou, 6, music

"My dream is to play college basketball while I'm pursuing my college education. AAU basketball keeps opening my mind to the ever-expanding game, **increasing my curiosity** and desire to learn even more about the game itself... I am constantly developing, and this allows me to not be too hard on myself when I notice some of my areas of improvement. I am blessed enough that my mentor brought the existence of the Ann Bancroft Foundation Grant to our attention. I took time to read more about Ann Bancroft; and it's all just amazing and inspiring. I wish that one day I too can have so much impact on the generations to come."





GRANTS BY ACTIVITY





GRANTEES BY GRADE AT TIME OF AWARD






Change simply doesn't happen without speaking up. We all need to use our voices to close equity gaps, find allies, and hold others accountable. I also played football in middle school. Other parents were often pulling my parents aside with concern and judgment. So early on, I was aware of the difference and have had to constantly push against barriers like sexism, racism, and homophobia for myself and others. I have dedicated my career, both professionally and in my community leadership, to using sports as a vehicle of change to fight for all marginalized groups and to leave this world better than I found it. Working with ABF is incredibly fulfilling, and I am honored to be a board member.

It's critical that we invest in girls. But it is not just girls' responsibilities to change the world. It takes all of us speaking out against things that are unjust, unfair, or discriminatory. It makes me proud that my seven-year-old son won't know a world where a woman can't do exactly what a man can do."

A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIR JACKIE HARTMAN

Twenty-five years ago, the movies “Men in Black” and “Titanic” topped the nation’s box office charts. “Wannabe”, by the Spice Girls, was a #1 hit on Billboard’s Hot 100. Men were also making 25% more than women for the same type of work.

While those pop-culture icons are now just a distant memory, the gender pay gap continues to be an all too familiar reality for many women. According to the Women’s Foundation’s 2018 report (and confirmed in 2022), Minnesota women will lose close to \$400,000 in lifetime earnings due to gender wage inequality. This gap widens for American Indian, Black, and Latina women. Our founders’ mission “to inspire girls to imagine something bigger” is as relevant today as it was in 1997. That year, Ann Bancroft and a small, dedicated group of volunteers launched the Ann Bancroft Foundation. Over the last 25 years, dedicated staff, board members, and partners have positively impacted thousands of “Trailblazers” across the state of Minnesota. Each one of the more than 5,300 issued grants shows a girl that she matters, that her interests are important, and that she is worthy of investment. As one of our Trailblazers recently wrote, “ABF gave me a chance to accomplish my dream. Thanks to this program, anything is possible.” With this young person’s mindset, and with your ongoing support, we can imagine a day where all Minnesotans are paid equitably!

In 2021, ABF adopted new methods to support our Trailblazers and, despite Covid, we supported many young girls in pursuing their dreams! We also underwent a significant organizational transition with a 100% turnover in our staff, which concerned many, including myself on some days. However, when faced with a tinge of anxiousness, I simply considered ABF’s passionate, talented, and committed Board, Founder, and part-time and interim staff and my calm was quickly restored. Indeed, my comfort was well-founded, as together we kept ABF moving forward, focused on what we do best: supporting girls’ dreams. At the beginning of fall of 2021, Ethelind Kaba accepted the Executive Director role and ensured the year closed successfully with an increase in the number of grants to girls and by exceeding our revenue goals.

Ethelind and her incredible team are now working with ABF’s supporters and advocates to imagine our next 25 years. Our heart-felt intention is for the Ann Bancroft Foundation to continue to work toward equity — well beyond the next 25 years!




